### The Last Goodnight

The final drips of the faucet plunked into the bottom of the silver sink like a pendulum lumbering to rest. We had just finished washing the dishes after a Sunday family dinner. While ice fishing with my uncle Matt earlier that day, my brother Kenny had caught enough fish to feed a wild pack of hungry teenage boys. Then it was off to bed with the four little trouble makers my parents called children.

However, as the stubborn 9 year old I was, I refused to succumb to slumber just yet. My mother and I stood in the narrow entryway of our teeny, tiny tin trailer house; I begged her to let me come out to the barn to help her with chores. Even though it was a frigid January evening, the thought of watching and helping my mother do what she loved drew me in like a cozy fire. As she clicked the tarnished clasps of her overall straps into place one at a time and drew on her barn boots one foot after the other, she gave me a proud grin but savagely crushed my hopes. She sent me to bed, and I listened with only a teeny bit more whining. "Goodnight, I love you," she whispered softly. I casually replied "Goodnight, I love you too", thinking nothing of this usual goodbye. Then she cracked open the flimsy, white plastic door and walked out into the tortuous winter wind, never to breathe another word again.

Later that evening my mother died of a genetic heart disease, and I was the last person she ever spoke to. This forever changed who I am, who I want to become, and most importantly, who I am in the eyes of God.

My Catholic faith has always been a significant part of my life. I was baptized at St. Bernard Catholic Church and attended school there for 8 years.

Along my faith journey I reached many milestones such as 1st reconciliation, 1st communion, and later, confirmation, but it wasn't until my mother died that I finally realized what it truly meant to me to be a child of God.

My faith had been damaged and put to the test, and at that moment I felt that it was beyond repair. I could not comprehend why God would do this to me. Why would he rip my mother away from me? End my childhood? Break our family? I was so mad! I was furious! What had I ever done to deserve this "wrath" from God? I blamed him. I blamed God for ruining my life, for putting me through this indescribable grief. The loss of my mother challenged my faith in countless ways. I questioned who he was, what I believed in, and almost every other part of my faith.

However, it was these questions, these doubts that ultimately allowed me to deeper understand God's role in my life. It wasn't until I questioned my faith that I could finally understand what I believe and what my faith meant to me.

I miss my mother with every fiber of my being and I will never ever stop missing her. But losing her allowed me to ultimately grow deeper in my relationship with God. I still question parts of my faith. And I still wonder what his plan is for me and why he needed my mother in heaven. But everyday I grow a little more and understand God a little better. My journey through my faith will never stop changing, but that's ok. It is this questioning, this searching that will continue to draw me closer to him.

Those tragic words, "Goodnight, I love you", shaped me into the woman of faith that I am today. I have a new perspective on God that has revealed something in my faith that would otherwise have blown away in that blustery January night.

The family is the foundation of co-existence and a remedy against social fragmentation. 
