



Twenty-Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time - September 25, 2022



Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Hear the Cry of the Poor

Jesus told the parable of the Rich man and Lazarus to reprove the Pharisees for their love of money and lack of mercy for the poor. Who is the rich man in this parable? Jesus does not give him a name, although he does name the poor, Lazarus, who lies at the door of the rich man. Jesus lets us to give a name to the rich man, and maybe it is our own. That possibility is open to each of us.

Naturally, we are tempted to ask the question, why is the rich man condemned to hell? It is not for being rich. He did not drive Lazarus out from in front of his door. He did not prevent him from eating the discarded crumbs from his table. Then what was the sin of the rich man in the parable? Sin of the rich man was not the sin of commission (doing something he should not have done), but a sin of omission (not doing something he should have done). He was being careless and indifferent to the poor man at his gate. He ignored the teaching of Sacred Scriptures. He led a life of luxury and self-indulgence, totally ignoring the cry of the poor people around him.

The parable is not meant to offend or upset those who have worked long and hard for their financial well-being. It is not wrong to be rich, but it is wrong not to share our wealth with our less fortunate brothers and sisters. The chief purpose of this parable is to arouse in us the responsibilities to bring God's mercy to others, especially, who are less fortunate than ourselves. The parable offers an invitation to each one of us to be conscious of the sufferings of those around us and to share our blessings generously.

The sin of the rich man was the same sin that is being committed over and over today. There is so much poverty in the world. The gap between the 'Rich and Lazarus' is growing gigantically. There is more than enough food produced in the world to feed everyone on the earth. Yet 811 million people, about 10% of the world's population, go to bed on an empty stomach each night. We live in the world's wealthiest nation. Still more than 13.1 million children in the United States are food insecure. Additionally, 14.5 million children live in poverty. (Source: Household Food Security in the United States, 2021)

Back in July 2021, UN World Food Program Executive Director David Beasley told us it would take an estimated \$40 billion dollars per year to feed all of the world's hungry people and end global hunger by 2030. According to data from the American Pet Products Association (APP), the amount we spend on pets grew to \$103.6 billion in 2020. It was \$45.4 billion dollars in 2009. We have the resources to feed the world. We just need the will.

We need to follow the teaching of Christ. The Christian can never be comfortable as long as a brother or a sister cries out in vain for bread or justice or love. Church continually reaches out to the poor and suffering throughout the world. We cannot allow our wealth to isolate us. We are all rich enough to share our blessings with others. God has blessed each one of us with wealth or health or special talents or social power or political influence or a combination of many blessings. The parable of the Rich man and Lazarus invites us to share with others in various ways what we have been given, instead of using everything exclusively for selfish gains. In other words, this parable is a warning that the selfish and extravagant use of God's blessings, like wealth, without sharing them with the poor and the needy, is a serious sin deserving eternal punishment.

October is the month of devotion to Rosary. We pray the Rosary twenty-five minutes before every weekend Mass with special intentions. You are welcome to join us.

Maintenance /"handy-person" needed.



"If they will not listen to Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded if someone should rise from the dead." Regardless of how the message of faith is received, a total conversion of mind and heart is needed for it to take root and have meaning. It is easy to become complacent and comfortable with all that life can afford us. Life can become "all about me," preserving my livelihood and protecting my securities.

Often, this drive can become so strong that we eagerly strive to protect our self-interests at the expense of others. Other people are necessary only to the extent that they are "useful" to us and profitable.


Merriam-Webster defines entitlement as "the belief that one is deserving of or entitled to certain privileges." In a world that pretends to offer us so many necessities, this is perhaps the greatest contemporary sin. When we feel "entitled" to something, even if it is perceived necessary, our relationships can get skewed. Unless we adopt a global vision of entitlement wherein everyone is entitled to the same things, we risk becoming extremely self-focused and selfish. All we care about is defending our rights and protecting our turf. This impulse can be so strong that we pursue it even at the expense of another. Is this what God intends for his children?

Holding on to this myopic vision, the plight and station of others are off our radar and of no real concern to us. Relying on our own merits and becoming resilient to life's challenges, we replace the true and real God with the one we created ourselves. Jesus and the prophets before him have consistently reminded us of the dangers of wealth, ignoring the poor and the needy, and becoming too fiercely independent and arrogant. Yet, we conduct our lives as if that message has never been preached. We give our faith a nod and never consider for a moment that we may be wrong in terms of what we see as important. "The things that we love tell us what we are (attributed to St. Thomas Aquinas)." Ponder those words a bit and remember that when we leave this world and go to the next one, what we loved here is what we will look for there. What we sought here may not be there. ©LPI
