

The Love Story between God and us



Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Soren Kierkegaard, a 19th century philosopher and theologian who lived in Denmark, wrote the parable of “The King and the Maiden”. The king was like no other king. This king was melted by love for a humble maiden. She had no standing in the royal court. She lived the ragged life of a peasant. Why the king should love her was beyond explaining and he could not stop loving her. The king knew that it was next to impossible for him to marry the peasant girl. But this king was so powerful that he knew he could marry the girl. How could he declare his love for her? If he brought her to the palace and crowned her head with jewels and clothed her body in royal robes, she would not resist. She would have to become the queen. But would she love him? Or would she live with him in fear, tending a private grief for the life she had left behind? Would she be happy at his side?

So, another thought occurred to him. The king laid aside his royal robes, and he took upon himself the life of a peasant. He dressed in rags. He did not just take on the outward appearance of a servant, he became a servant. He became as ragged as the one he loved, so that she could be his forever. He had renounced his throne to declare his love and to win her hand

The king in his story is God and the maiden in the story is each one of us. It is the true story of God’s love for each one of us. However, this story is not a perfect analogy for the Incarnation. God is more than royalty. He is divinity. God’s love for us is infinite; he loves us more than the king could ever love the peasant girl. But this story gives us some explanation to the meaning of the Incarnation, the coming of God in the man Jesus. God could have loved us and kept his divine status. But that would have made the gap between us too great. It would be hard for us to love God freely. So, God decided to become one of us. We read in the third chapter of the Gospel of John, “God loved the people of this world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him will have eternal life.” (Jn 3:16).

In the person of Jesus Christ, God decided to become a lowly human being. He decided to declare His love for us in a way that we would understand perfectly and respond to freely. What Kierkegaard expressed in parable form, St. Paul expressed in these words about Jesus Christ: “Though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God something to be grasped. Rather, he emptied himself, taking the form of a servant, coming in human likeness; and found human in appearance, he humbled himself, becoming obedient to death, even death on a cross.” (Philippians 2:6-8)

The love story between God and us is still going on. This story is not yet ended. Each one of us is in the process of writing his or her own personal ending to that story. Each one of us is in the process of deciding whether we will accept God’s love or reject it. Each one of us is in the process of deciding whether we will live happily with God forever after. Christmas is God saying, ‘I love you so much that I gave you my Son. Love one another as I love you.’




